Excise Tax on New Homes

The debate about how to pay for school construction has led Howard County legislators to approve an excise tax on new construction homes.

The new \$1-per-square-foot tax will be targeted to pay for the new high school and three new elementary school buildings to be built over the next four years. County Executive James N. Robey tried to increase the transfer tax on the sale of all real estate in the county to pay for the new schools, but that proposal was defeated both last year and this year. The excise tax is an alternative.

The question that remains on the minds of county officials is, "Will it be enough?" The proposed transfer tax increase would have generated about \$200 million, whereas the new excise tax, which will apply only to new homes priced more than \$200 thousand, is expected to raise \$58 million. The new high school, now being built across from Mount View Middle School, is expected to cost \$53 million, leaving the legislators scrambling for additional ways to pay the bill.

You may already be in a mild state of shock with the recent increase in the taxable assessment on your home. If yours increased by more than 40 percent, you are among the majority. But it's hard to argue against the valuation considering what has happened to the sale price of county homes.

What does all this mean to you? Well, as Howard County homeowners, we expect the value of our homes to continue to climb. And, of course, the taxes on them will grow, too. (Another reason our number system is infinite.)
